Conocer vs. Saber

Both Conocer and Saber mean "to know" in English, but in Spanish they represent two different types of knowing.

Saber is to know a fact, particular information, or skill (how to do something).

Conocer is to know (be familiar) people, places and general concepts.

Conjugate each in the present tense as you see here:

CONOCER		SAE	SABER	
conozco	conocemos	sé	sabemos	
conoces	conocéis	sabes	sabéis	
conoce	conocen	sabe	saben	

Notice that both verbs are irregular because they have "yo" forms that do not follow the typical pattern.

Conocer

We use Conocer to talk about a person, place or thing with which we are familiar or about which we have a general understanding. When you speak of knowing a person, remember to use the Personal "a". For example:

Sí, conozco a Rosa. ¿Conoces al novio de María? Conoces San Francisco bien. Andrés conoce un lugar bueno. Yes, I know Rosa. Do you know María's fiancé? You know San Francisco well. Andrés knows a good place.

We also use Conocer to talk about general concepts or subjects:

Conozco la poesía de Betancor. Ella quiere conocer tu país. Me gustaría conocerte mejor. Conocer la hermosura es vivir. I'm familiar with Betancor's Poetry. She wants to know your country. I would like to know you better. To know beauty is to live.

Saber

Since Saber is all about facts—the who, what, when, where, why and how of situations and events—only Saber can be followed by a question word. For example:

Saben cuándo es el concierto. Tú sabes cuál es la calle, ¿no? Sabemos qué tienes en la bolsa. Nico sabe dónde está la fiesta. Yo sé cómo lo haces.

They know when the concert is. You know which street it is, right? We know what you have in the bag. Nico knows where the party is. I know how you do it.

Question words can come before either Conocer or Saber. For example:

¿A quién conoces del grupo? ¿Cómo conoces Berlin tan bien? ¿Cuál persona conoces mejor? ¿Cuando sabrás la respuesta? ¿Cómo sabes tanto? ¿Qué sabes tú? Who do you know from the group? How do you know Berlin so well? Which person do you know better? When will you know the answer? How do you know so much? What do you know?

We also use Saber to express or describe what we know "how to do" by following it with an infinitive. For example:

Yo sé montar a caballo. Jessica sabe bailar bien. ¿Tú sabes dibujar? Ya sabemos nadar. I know how to ride a horse.
Jessica knows how to dance well.
Do you know how to draw?
We already know how to swim.
