Cervantes' Don Quixote—recognized by many scholars as the first modern novel-was not only groundbreaking in the 16th century when first published, but continues to fascinate and inspire current audiences.

Learn Spanish to make lifelong friends.

As most people would probably recognize, the primary purpose of a language is to facilitate communication between people. However, what many people don't realize is that learning a foreign language—although intimidating at times—opens many doors to making new and interesting friends.

Getting to know someone by communicating with them in their own language is a great way to really become much more intimately acquainted rather than relying upon interpretation and body language. Study, practice and exposure to the language are vital to effective and successful communication.

Although becoming proficient in any language takes great effort, dedication and time on the part of the learner, the rewards are great.
